2. **Attending the WCB's Workplace Health and Safety Conference on May 6, 2025.** The conference takes place at the Delta Hotel, in downtown Charlottetown.
3. **Completing all 3 assigned in-school activities** and submitting a final report.
4. **Promoting health and safety** to young workers and **HAVING FUN!**

To apply you must be:

- In Grade 11 or 12
- Good at connecting with other students and coordinating with school staff
- Interested in learning, and helping others to learn, about how to stay safe at work
